The majority of exam questions will come from the literature published within the last **five** years. This five year period is defined as from July 1<sup>st</sup> of the year 6 years before the exam until July 1<sup>st</sup> of the year immediately preceding the exam. E.g. for candidates taking the exam in February 2023, this five year period is from July 1<sup>st</sup> 2017 – July 1<sup>st</sup> 2022. Literature published within this period includes early view articles that are accepted and published by the journals in an online format. Questions may also come from older articles if they are considered significant and essential to the application of veterinary surgery.

This list of journals is not intended to be a compulsory reading list but candidates should be encouraged to select publications within these journals that apply to investigation, diagnosis and management of surgical conditions.
